SFAC Assists Wounded Warriors Through Trying Times

Navigating the military health care system following injury or illness may present a seemingly impossible mountain to climb for many Soldiers and their families. In order to assist during this time, the Army created Soldier and Family Assistance Centers; comprehensive, centralized coordinating offices that provide a variety of services to assist Soldiers and their families with administrative and personal needs during their stay at Warrior Transition Units

According to Christopher Watson, director of the SFAC at the Walter Reed National Military Medical Center in Bethesda, Maryland, "[The SFAC] is there to provide tailored support services and act as an information broker and clearing house for our Warriors in Transition and their families. We are here to assist them in any way we can when they are making life-changing decisions as they transition back to duty or to civilian life."

Watson said the SFAC provides a comfortable, friendly, one-stop center with a lounge that provides sofas, TV, games, computers with internet service, and snacks for people that need a place to unwind, or wait to speak to a counselor.

With a staff of approximately 20 people, the SFAC helps Wounded Warriors and their families with everyday needs that the military doesn't provide, as well as a conduit for assistance from the Fisher House Foundation, Yellow Ribbon Fund, Walter Reed Society and other organizations that assist the Wounded Warriors.

"For example, if a Soldier or the family needs money to pay bills back home, they can apply through us to the Walter Reed Society, after seeking help from the Army Emergency Relief and other organizations" Watson said.

The goals of the SFAC, according to Watson, are to provide assistance to 100 percent of the Warriors in Transition that are assigned or attached to the WRNMMC Warrior Transition Brigade and their family members; to co-sponsor events in support of the Warriors in Transition; to establish links with outside organizations to support the

Warrior in Transition and family members; to in-process 100 percent of all Warriors in Transition that are assigned or attached to the WTB; to market the SFAC program to allow the community to fully understand the support that is being provided; maintain a database of quick access programs that can assist with lodging, taxi services, rental vehicles and airline flights, and; maintain the Client Tracking System; and to account for the SFAC support provided to the WIT and their family members.

"We are here to assist the men and women who have sacrificed so much for our nation, and to help their families through some very difficult times. My goal, and the goal of everyone here, is to make sure these heroes get all of the help they need and make this process as easy as possible," Watson said.

WRS Acknowledges Charitable Donors



Society Appreciates Webmaster

Lyn Albrecht is the Webmaster for the Walter Reed Society. Starting in May 2003 at the former Walter Reed Army Medical Center, and currently at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center, she has been employed by the Deployment Health Clinical Center (DHCC) as a writer and editor.

Although never a member of the military, Albrecht has ties with the Army and Air Force.

"My grandfather was in the Army Medical Corps in World War I. At that time, you didn't even need a medical degree to be a physician. He was a surgeon in his twenties who was sent on one of the last troop ships to Europe," she said. "More than half the Soldiers on his ship died of influenza during the voyage, and my father remembered how my grandfather described how they would go from being hale and hearty young men to turning blue and dying within 12 hours. time the ship arrived, the armistice had been signed."

Albrecht was born at Chinook Air Force Base in Rantoul, Illinois. "My parents used to joke that I cost five dollars," she said. After completing high school in Michigan she received a bachelor's degree in anthropology from Princeton University and a master's of science in computer science from Oakland Univer-

Albrecht then moved to Maryland where she worked for the IBM Federal Systems Division writing software for the command and control and telemetry processing of Air Force Satellites, the GPS satellite system, and NASA's space shuttle program. She also worked for nearly 20 years at General Electric Information Systems, the National Institutes of Health before landing a position at DHCC.

"I'm not a doctor or a nurse. I can't provide hands-on care to the wounded service members, but I am a writer with an IT background, so in my own little way, I like to think I am helping. My support of such a worthwhile organization as the Walter Reed Society means a lot to me."

WRS Recognizes Life-Time Supporter


